

Key Unit Vocabulary

This report provides a summary of key vocabulary for this unit. For each word, you will find the definition, part of speech, word forms (plurals/tenses), synonyms, and examples of how the word, or forms of the word, are used in a sentence.

authority

• the right, power, or ability to give orders, make decisions, or demand or compel obedience

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	authorities, authoritative, authoritatively
Synonyms:	command, control, power
In a sentence:	As the principal, she has the greatest amount of authority in this school.

caravan

• a band of people traveling together for safety, especially across a desert

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	caravans, caravanserai
Synonyms:	convoy, procession
In a sentence:	The travelers rejoiced as their caravan neared the entrance to the city.

commerce

• the exchange of goods or services for money

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	commercial
Synonyms:	business, trade, dealings
In a sentence:	The trade agreement is expected to increase commerce between the two nations.

culture

• the sum of the language, customs, beliefs, and art considered characteristic of a particular group of people

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	cultures, cultural, culturing, cultured
Synonyms:	civilization, folkway
In a sentence:	The Catholic Church has played a large role in the development of French culture.

diaspora

• a scattering of any people with a common culture

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	diasporas, diasporic
Synonyms:	exodus, dispersal, exile
In a sentence:	When war broke out in their home country, a large diaspora settled in a neighboring nation.



diffusion

• the spreading or wide scattering of something, such as technology or belief systems

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	diffusional
Synonyms:	dispersion, spread
In a sentence:	The diffusion of new technologies increased as trade routes expanded.

economy

• the system, within a particular country, or region, of handling wealth and resources, producing goods and services, and consuming goods and services

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	economic, economically, economies
Synonyms:	kingdom, domain
In a sentence:	The American economy was particularly strong in the 1950s.

empire

• territory controlled by a central government, with one supreme ruler, who governs a diverse population

Part of spe	ch: noun
Word fo	ms: empires
Synon	ms: kingdom, domain
In a sente	The Ottoman Empire ruled over a vast territory with multiple ethnicities and belief systems.

indigenous

• having origin in a country or locality

Part of speech:	adjective
Word forms:	indigenously, indigenousness
Synonyms:	native, aboriginal
In a sentence:	The indigenous people of Hawaii suffered illnesses brought by missionaries and other settlers.

maritime

• of or concerning seagoing vessels, or intended for use in navigation at sea

Part of speech:	adjective
Word forms:	mariner
Synonyms:	marine, nautical, naval
In a sentence:	Ship captains must obey maritime laws.



merchant

• one who buys goods and sells them for a profit

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	merchants
Synonyms:	dealer, trader, vendor, salesperson
In a sentence:	We order our food from whichever merchant gives us the best price.

migration

• the act or process of moving from one region into another

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	migrations, migrant, migratory, migrate
Synonyms:	journey, movement, exodus
In a sentence:	Their ancestors' migration from the east finally led to them settling in this small western mining town.

monsoon

• predictable winds that indicated the arrival of the rainy season, facilitating fast sailing and assisting maritime travelers

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	monsoons
Synonyms:	deluge, rainstorm
In a sentence:	Reoccurring monsoons allowed sailors to predict the direction of winds across the Indian Ocean.

navigate

• to direct the course of a vessel, especially a boat or ship

Part of speech:	verb
Word forms:	navigates, navigation, navigator
Synonyms:	steer, direct, pilot
In a sentence:	Indian Ocean sailors learned to navigate currents and monsoon winds to reach their destination.

network

• any physical system of interconnected roads, lines, canals, or the like; a process that involves a number of persons, groups, or organizations

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	networks, networking, networked
Synonyms:	web, organization
In a sentence:	Networks of exchange and trade have existed in Africa for thousands of years.



pastoral

• of or relating to the country or country life

Part of speech:	adjective
Word forms:	pastoralist
Synonyms:	rural, agrarian
In a sentence:	She liked to paint pastoral scenes with meadows, streams, and fields with cows grazing.

plague

• any disaster that affects a large population, especially a disease epidemic or the sudden influx of harmful insects

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	plagues
Synonyms:	contagion, infection
In a sentence:	The crops were destroyed by a plague of locusts.

society

• a community or group of people who live in the same country or area and are linked with each other by such things as laws and customs

Part of speech	noun
Word forms	societies, societal
Synonyms	community, association, network, group
In a sentence	Every society considers some behaviors acceptable and others unacceptable.

subjugation

• the act of winning mastery over, as by military conquest

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	subjugate
Synonyms:	conquest, invasion
In a sentence:	Raids by the Mongols led to their subjugation of Central Asia and Eastern Europe.

syncretism

• an attempted combination or reconciliation of different principles, beliefs, or practices, especially in religion or philosophy

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	syncretic, syncretistic, syncretist
Synonyms:	unification, consolidation
In a sentence:	The syncretism of the two religions was made possible by their shared goal to unite the people of the river valley.



technology

• the various inventions and means of solving problems that result from research for use of industrial arts and applied science to achieve practice objectives

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	technologies, technological
Synonyms:	machinery, tools, automation
In a sentence:	The compass, a new technology that traveled from China to the Indian Ocean and beyond, helped merchants and sailors navigate on land and by sea.

trade

• the act of buying and selling commodities, or all such acts collectively

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	tradeable, tradeless
Synonyms:	commerce, business, exchange
In a sentence:	The new treaty will strongly affect trade between the two countries.

trade network

• a series of roads, waterways, railroads, and air routes that allow groups to trade goods with one another; a loose organization of societies that exchange goods with each other

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	trade networks
Synonyms:	exchange network
In a sentence:	In both ancient and modern times, trade networks have allowed for cultural exchange between societies.

urbanization

• the process whereby towns and cities grow and societies become more urban

Part of speech:	noun
Word forms:	urban, urbanize, urbanizing
Synonyms:	
In a sentence:	Many trading posts and towns went through the process of urbanization as more merchants settled in these areas.
